

Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Club

This week our scientists were continuing with research into what 5p, 10p, 20p and 50p coins were made from. The students were also researching how we define the purity of gold. This included researching what was meant by a Karat and how this related to a metal's purity. They also looked into gold hallmarks and the assay office in identifying the purity of gold. The students were then planning how they could link this with what they have already carried out in their practical work and how they would investigate gold objects such as jewellery to prove their purity and to see if they are pure or fake!

Book of the Week



To tie in with the MCSP Harry Potter Quiz next week, the book of the week is Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone by JK Rowling.

The first novel in the Harry Potter series, it follows Harry Potter, a young wizard who discovers his magical heritage on his eleventh birthday, when he receives a letter of acceptance to Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry. Harry makes close friends and a few enemies during his first year at the school, and with the help of his friends, Harry faces an attempted comeback by the dark wizard Lord Voldemort, who killed Harry's parents, but failed to kill Harry when he was just 15 months old.


The book was first published in the United Kingdom in 1997. It won most of the British book awards that were judged by children. The book reached the top of the New York Times list of best-selling fiction in August 1999 and stayed near the top of that list for much of 1999 and 2000. It has been translated into at least 73 other

languages, and has been made into a feature-length film of the same name, as have all six of its sequels.

Most reviews were very favourable, commenting on Rowling's imagination, humour, simple, direct style and clever plot construction. The writing has been compared to that of Jane Austen, one of Rowling's favourite authors; Roald Dahl, whose works dominated children's stories before the appearance of Harry Potter; and the Ancient Greek storyteller Homer. While some commentators thought the book looked backwards to Victorian and Edwardian boarding school stories, others thought it placed the genre firmly in the modern world by featuring contemporary ethical and social issues, as well as overcoming obstacles like bullies. It still continues to capture the imaginations of children and adults alike 22 years later and encourage those reluctant readers to step into a wonderful, fantastical world full of adventure.
