Vaping/ E-Cigarettes

Recently we have had to deal with some incidents of students vaping or carrying e-cigarettes whilst in school. We take this issue very seriously due to the negative health effects vaping can have on our students and the risks around vaping. Vaping is the act of inhaling a vapor produced by an electronic vaporizer or e-cigarette. The vapor can contain nicotine and other substances which is concerning. The liquids that are vaporized come in many different flavors and might even smell fruity. For example, many of the flavors of these liquid concentrates, or 'vape juices', are sweet and even have names such as, cinnamon roll, marshmallow, grape, strawberry, bubblegum, lemonade and cookies.

Vaporizers/e-cigarettes come in all different shapes. Some common styles look like a thick pen, a stylus for an iPad, a flash drive, or a small flask with a round chimney coming off the top. The devices are very small and can easily be hidden on a person or blend in with normal backpack items. Like cigarettes, stores cannot sell vaping items to people under the age of 18. However, devices can be bought online or from older siblings, friends, or unfortunately even adults.

Students may not be aware of the harmful effects of vaping. <u>Vaping is prohibited at MHHS and any student found to be vaping or in possession of a Vaporizer/e-cigarette will be in big trouble and dealt with very seriously.</u> Our aim is to work together with parents and carers to help support our students in making positive decisions for themselves and their future. We encourage you to have a conversation with your son/daughter about this topic if you have any concerns. Thank you for your continued support.

Student Leadership and the Opening of our New 'Well- Being Room':

Our Head Students, alongside our Student Council and Senior Leadership Team have created a Student Leadership Improvement Plan. This plan looks at ways we can make Mossley Hollins an even better place to be for students and staff.



This week, our student leaders have led online assemblies to all Year Groups to talk about one particular aspect of their Improvement Plan- providing more support for our student's mental health.

Remote Learning for Isolating Students

If a student is isolating (as a result of a positive Covid test) and is well enough to work from home, then they can access their timetabled lessons on their Microsoft Teams calendar. Teachers will stream their lessons from their classrooms to enable students to access their learning from home. If a student is due to undertake a practical lesson (such as Drama, Dance, Food and Nutrition etc.) then their class teacher will set an assignment on the class' page on Microsoft Teams to complete during their timetabled session. These assignments will be clearly labelled with instructions by their teacher.

If the usual classroom is not available this may impact on live streaming. In this case, work will be set via the assignment section in teams.

Chewing Gum

We would like to make it clear to all parents/carers and students that chewing gum is a banned item at Mossley Hollins High School. Any student found to be chewing gum in the building will serve internal exclusion for a day. There are a number of reasons behind this, including the mess that it leaves behind, the difficultly of removing it from our carpets, chairs, desks and tarmac outside and more importantly, the distraction to learning and the negative impact it can have in the classroom. After feedback from our student council and teaching staff, we did adapt our behavior policy and made the decision to reduce the sanction for chewing gum at Mossley Hollins High School from a fixed term exclusion to internal exclusion. We have the highest of expectations of students at Mossley Hollins High School and as always we really appreciate the support from parents and carers with this matter.






UKMT Preparation



School Expectations

Equipment

Students who wish to succeed at our school always bring the right equipment, for the right lessons, each day. Students do not need to bring all of their books but should select the right ones the previous evening. Students must bring to school: pencil case; the 2Ps and 2Rs (pen, pencil, ruler & rubber); their planner; DEAR-reader; Correct coloured lanyard; the books and folders for that day; their PE kit when they have PE and a scientific calculator.



Masks and Lanyards

As you will know students are now required to wear masks when moving around inside the school building. At the moment quite a number of students are coming to school without masks. We do have a limited supply of temporary medical masks, which we can issue. I am sure that you will agree that our limited school funds are best spent on resources such as books and equipment to aid your child's learning. Please ensure your child arrives each day with a clean mask, disposable masks should be replaced frequently.

Lanyards

Lanyards are also a compulsory part of the school uniform. Students were issued with a lanyard at the start of the academic year and many students have had several replacements already. Despite our clear rules and reminders, some students are not wearing them. Please ensure that your child wears their lanyard each day for school and that they look after this. We will provide one replacement free of charge, any subsequent lanyards will cost £1.

Punctuality

We would like to remind everyone of the importance of arriving to school promptly each morning. Should your child arrive later, they must enter through pupil reception by crossing the bridge. This applies to students in all year groups.

School Shoes

We would like to remind parents, carers and students of the footwear, which will be deemed acceptable and unacceptable. Footwear must not resemble trainers and shoes manufactured by sportswear companies and will not be allowed. Canvas or leather converse/vans style pumps will not be allowed, nor will any footwear that covers the ankle. Please be aware that some companies market shoes as school shoes but in fact, they are not acceptable as they have logos and/or trainer like soles. Other shops, such as Clarks have also begun to design their school shoes to look like trainers. Shoes must be all black including the stitching, sole and trim. Logos of any kind are not acceptable, including Kickers. If students arrive in school with inappropriate shoes, they will not be permitted into lessons.


